The NASA Biennial Conference was a great one this year. Steve Stusek and his team did a fantastic job (especially Eric Gargrave, who was in charge of the weather). One of the highlights for me was the diversity of programming. I heard more Bach, and Bach-influenced pieces, than at any other conference I've been to, and there was still plenty of new music to hear. In fact, I heard more new pieces that I want to play than I've heard at other conferences.

Aside from the programming, I enjoyed visiting the music vendors and digging through the box of music for "saxophone and miscellaneous". I found several pieces I'll be able to play with my chamber-music-and-snacks friends next season. Having lunch and dinner with friends old and new rounded out the fun for me.

I took a non-scientific survey of people I ran into at dinner and in the hotel lobby on the last night to find out what the highlight of the conference was for other people. James Kalyn of the North Carolina School of the Arts was impressed by Otis Murphy's concerto performance, and the Duquesne University Quartet's performance of Sherwood Shaffer's music. Competition winner Michael Ibrahim's performance of the Stockhausen stood out for Phil Bravo of Michigan State University. For Tom Liley, of Joliet Junior College, the highlight of conferences is "always the master classes by people such as Fred Hemke and Eugene Rousseau." Julia Nolen of the University of

British Columbia said, "Otis was quite spectacular" in the Carmen Fantasy. She also thought the Meta-4 Quartet gave a great performance. NASA president Joe Lulloff said the best part of the conference was "seeing all you guys."

For Victor Morosco of California, the highlight of the conference was getting to hear and meet people he's heard good things about. Morosco summed up the conference best, observing the packed hotel lobby bar at midnight after the last day. Fischoff and Saxophone Quartets- The Winning Tradition Continues!

For the 10th consecutive year, saxophone quartet(s) earned winning medals at the prestigious Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition. The 31st annual competition, held in South Bend, IN May 21-23, 2004, named the Third Rail Saxophone Quartet of Mystic, CT as Bronze Medal Winners in the Senior Winds Division. Gold and Silver medals were both awarded to trios of assorted instrumentations. The Third Rail Quartet consists of Joshua Thomas, soprano; Greg Case, alto; Adam Williamson, tenor; and Richard Wyman, baritone- all four are members of the U.S. Coast Guard Band in New London, CT. The Quartet's competition repertoire included Grave et Presto (Rivier), Quatuor pourSaxophones (Desenclos), Quatuor pour Saxophones (Lacour), and Four For Tango (Piazzolla). Besides Saxophone Quartet, no other type of standard wind chamber music ensemble (Brass Quintet, Woodwind Quintet, etc.) has had such a consistent showing in Fishoff's winner circles.
