NASA Members Perform Summer Concerts

The ensemble "C'est La Vie," which included saxophonist **George Wolfe**, performed a recital of French music at the Chautauqua Institution dedicated to Danieel Deffayet.

"Teachers change lives," so says George Wolfe, classical saxophonist and member of the chamber group Ensemble "C'est La Vie." Wolfe studied with the great French saxophonist Daniel Deffayet, who passed away last year after a brilliant career performing around the world and serving as Professor of Saxophone at the Paris Conservatory of Music. The recital, was held on June 29, at 4:00 PM in the Hall of Christ, and was dedicated to the memory of his teacher. "Monsieur Deffayet was a kind, encouraging, yet demanding teacher who inspired me in many ways. I owe him a great deal. He was a marvelous mentor, and this recital is one way I can express my gratitude to him and his family."

The program is made up entirely of French music and featured works by composers Paule Maurice, Darius Milhaud, Claude Debussy, Albert Roussel, Jacques Charpentier, and Pierre Max Dubois.

Kenneth Tse has recently given, with pianist Su-Yen Chee, the very first classical saxophone recital/master class tour in Malaysia. The saxophone is still known primarily as a jazz/pop instrument in that part of the world but the audience was very appreciative of the repertoire and the sound. Kenneth Tse's Ipoh performance, organised by The Perak Society of Performing Arts, was on June 26 at The Dome. Meru Valley Resort. On June 29, he performed the premiere saxophone recital at the Mini Theatre, Sabah Trade Centre in Kota Kinabalu (a beautiful island with the best diving locations in the world). Tse's final guest recital and workshop occurred during Yamaha's Wind Expo in Malaysia's capital Kuala Lumpur was on July 3, at Manhattan Hall, Berjaya Times Square.

Miles Osland, Director of Jazz Studies and Professor of Saxophone at the University of Kentucky, recently returned from a two week stay at the Conservatorio de Tatui in Sao Paulo, Brazil as an artist in residence. The residency was an amazing journey that included standing room only master classes, clinics and sold out concerts. While in Sao Paulo, Professor Osland taught Saxophone Technique, Improvisation and Jazz Technique master classes.

Osland also traveled to Jau (a rural city near the birthplace of the great soccer star Pele), for an outreach clinic and performance with the Experimental Jazz Orchestra at the "Sound Station" music school (a converted train station).

The Conservatorio de Tatui has an international reputation as one of the finest music conservatories in the world. With a student population of over 3,000, it is the only government funded music school in all of Brazil.

Londeix, Street and Admiral to tour U.S. and Canada

Saxophonists Jean-Marie Londeix, **William H. Street** and pianist Roger Admiral will present a tour of concerts, master classes and lectures throughout the United States and Canada from February 8-27, 2005. The concert program presented by Street and Admiral will include music selected from the standard repertory as well as newly commissioned works.

The lecture topics presented in French by Professor Londeix and translated into English by Professor Street will include: The saxophone before jazz; The

saxophone in its many guises or a brief history of the saxophone; The saxophone in the various musical streams of Twentieth century music; Claude DEBUSSY and the Rhapsodie with saxophone (including new 2004 research discoveries); The saxophone and neoclassicism; Standard works of the saxophone repertory... Desenclos/Ibert/Glazounov, etc.; and A traditional system of practicing and an overview of musical study in France. Other new topics will also be added to the available list.
