Clarion Saxophone Workshop

Report on the Thailand International Composition Competition for Saxophone

Dear saxophonists, I am writing to give you the results of the Thailand International Composition Competition for Saxophone. There were 123 pieces submitted from composers representing 33 countries. The first round was judged by the composition faculty of Mahidol University in Thailand. They narrowed it down to three finalists in each of three categories: solo with or without piano, saxophone quartet and saxophone ensemble. The judges for the finals held at Mahidol University were Eugene Rousseau, William Street and Roger Greenberg. Bravo to Shyen Lee, saxophone professor at Mahidol University, who performed the solo compositions, and also with the quartet for the finals. He did an outstanding job with very difficult music and because of the logistics of the competition, he had very little preparation time. The Saxophone Quartet and the Thailand Saxophone Ensemble also did a great job playing the final three pieces in these categories. Many thanks go to Mahidol University College of Music and Dr. Sugree Charoensook, Dean of the College, for sponsoring this event. The winners, listed below, will be premiered at the World Saxophone Congress this

First Place Solo category

'Nangu 'na ngoni xtä xi thutsi mä tuhu (2006) for solo baritone saxophone by Gabriel Pareyon

This piece was completed after a long collaboration between the Dutch saxophonist Ties Mellema and the composer, living in Amsterdam since the year 2000. At the beginning of this collaboration, the first demand regarding artistic and technical aspects was to create some materials with the widest variety of instrumental resources, but with the less of structural elements. This means that the musician has to demonstrate a high

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hivirtuosic level in order to obtain many details on tuning, phraseology, rhythm and texture, whereas, in reality, he is playing "the same note" all along the composition. This note, a C (written A in transposing notation for the baritone saxophone in Eb) corresponds to the instrument pedal pitch and its doubled frequencies, i.e., its consecutive octaves.

These various "C" must be produced by a constant change of fingerings for the same notes, but playing homonym pitches with different color and tuning. This technique, known as "bisbigliando", has here a very high development.

Like other names in the repertoire of the composer, this one has a title in Hnahnu, an ancient language form Central Mexico, ant it means, "Every whisper has inscribed all names".

GABRIEL PAREYON

(b. Zapopan, Jalisco, Mexico, 23.10.1974)

Gabriel Pareyon trained at the School of Music of the University of Guadalajara from 1989 to 1993 and at the Composers' Workshop of the National Conservatoire of Mexico from 1995 to 1998. He received a composition master degree at the Royal Conservatoire, The Hague, where he studied with Clarence Barlow

Nowadays he is developing his doctoral project in musicology at the University of Amsterdam. Recently he also entered as member of the International Seminar on Musical Semiotics at the University of Helsinki.

He won the Andrzej Panufnik International Composers' competition in

Krakow, 2001, and was awarded the title of Laureate at the Tchaikovsky Conservatoire International Composers' competition in Moscow, 2003. Pareyon's output includes works for soloist and ensembles, chorus, symphony orchestra, opera and music theatre which have been performed in Argentina, Australia, Austria, Belgium, Chile, Cuba, France, Italy, Mexico, the Netherlands, Poland, Russia, Spain and Switzerland.

First Place Saxophone Quartet Category "Dévines" for SATR Seventions

"Dérives" for SATB Saxophone Quartet by Juan-Manuel Marrero

This piece brings together textures, gestures and figures. It is a kaleidoscope of shapes where different dynamics and rhythmic aspects evolve like a unified structure in a progressive drift.

MARRERO JUAN-MANUEL

(b. 1970, Spain)

Composer and musicologist. With Doctor in Aesthetic, Science and Technology of arts from Paris 8 University, Marrero Juan-Manuel works as composition teacher and research scholar in the department of arts at Marne-la-Vallee University, France. Also, he is researcher at CICM (Centre d'Informatique et Creation Musicale, Paris 8 University, France) and Litteformes/LISAA (University de Marne-la-Vallee, France).

First Place Saxophone Ensemble Category Duels (2006) by Volodymyr Runchak

Sound Duels are taking place between musicians who are playing in various parts of the hall. The sounds coming from various sides sometimes unite into one harmonious sounding, but more often they conflict with each other. The audience, the performers and the conductor are very close to each another. This creates an impression of a one united whole eminating sounds where the listener becomes also a performer.

VOLODYMYR RUNCHAK

(b. 1960 in Lutsk, Ukraine)

Mr. Runchak studied accordion at the Music College of Lutsk from 1975-79 and graduated as accordionist, conductor and composer from the National music Academy of Ukraine in Kyiv in 1986. He is member of the National Composers Union of Ukraine, National All-Ukraine Music Union, EUROPE-EUROPE (Germany) Int'l Assoc. of Composers, Ukrainian Chapter of ISCM. Among his honors are First Prize at the All-Ukrainian Accordion Competition (1984). First Prize at the International Choral Works Competition (Ukraine-USA, 1998), International Choral Works Competition Prize, Rheinsberg, Germany (1998), Grand Priz at the International Accordion Composers Competition in Sanok, Poland (2003). In 2005 a high recognition for "Merit to Polish Culture" was awarded to him by the Polish Minister of Culture, Mr. Waldemar Dombrowski.

Saxophonist Timothy McAllister has joined the faculty of The University of Arizona School of Music in Tucson.
