Through the generous donation of Dr. and Mrs. Eugene Rousseau, the studio at the new building will be named "Eugene Rousseau Saxophone Studio."




The Rita Benton Music Library at the University of Iowa invites donations of scores, manuscripts, books, recordings, photos, correspondence, and other documentation for the purpose of establishing the International Saxophone Archives. The Archives will serve as a research center, accessible library of scores and recordings, and an archival space for saxophone history. Anticipated donations include the Thomas Liley papers and recordings from the collection of Kenneth Tse. The library already houses over 800 scores of saxophone literature gifted by Iowa alumnus saxophonist Eugene Rousseau. This archive will have a reciprocal relationship with the Association of the European Center for Saxophone in Bordeaux, France.

The Rita Benton Music Library holds over 200,000 items—books, scores, recordings, and other materials—in its collections. The Library's Rare Book Room contains over 3,000 books, scores, and manuscripts. Other collections of note include the Himie Voxman Archive and the Goldman Band Library. 

Biographies | Featured Guest Artists



Soloist, researcher and pedagogue, **Claude Delangle**, one of the greatest contemporary saxophonists, stands out as the master of the French saxophone. Privileged interpreter for classic works, he enriches the repertoire and encourages creation by collaborating with the most renowned composers, including L. Berio, P. Boulez, Toru Takemitsu, A. Piazzolla, and promoting the youngest. Since 1986, he is invited saxophonist in the Ensemble

Intercontemporain, he also appears as soloist with the most prestigious orchestras (London BBC, Radio France, Radio of Finland, WDR Köln, Berlin Philharmonic, Kioi Tokyo) and works with D. Robertson, P. Eötvös, K. Nagano, E.P. Salonen, Miung Wung Chung, G. Bernstein and many other conductors. Passionate for his instrument, he goes beyond the work of the soloist and frequents the Musical Acoustic Laboratories of the University of Paris 7. The results of his research on specific acoustics of the saxophone will be for him a precious asset in his collaboration with composers. His recordings for BIS, Deutsche Grammophon, Harmonia Mundi, Erato and Verany bring out French music while revealing new musical horizons from the repertoire created by the brilliant Adolphe Sax to the avant-garde works or the popular repertoire. After obtaining several outstanding Premiers Prix at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique of Paris, Claude Delangle was appointed professor in 1988, where he has created the most prestigious saxophone class in the world.



Dr. **Frederick L. Hemke** is the Louis and Elsie Snydacker Eckstein Emeritus Professor of Music in the Bienen School of Music, Northwestern University. Dr. Hemke is the first American to win a Premier Prix in Saxophone, from the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique, Paris in 1955, where he was a student of the eminent saxophonist and pedagogue, Marcel Mule. Dr. Hemke is internationally recognized as an adjudicator,

a master teacher, and a concert soloist. He has recorded with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Kronos String Quartet, the Stockholm Philharmonic, the Japan Radio Orchestra, the Korea Philharmonic Orchestra, the New Zealand National Symphony, the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Eastman Wind Ensemble, the Northwestern University Wind Ensemble, the University of Wisconsin Wind Ensemble, the Chicago Contemporary Chamber Players. Three of his CD recordings, Fascinating Rhythm (Saxophone and String Quintet). Simple Gifts (Saxophone and Organ) and The American Saxophonist (Saxophone and Piano) are issued on the "EnF" label. The Hemke Concerto, recorded with New Haven Symphony Orchestra, is available on the "Nimbus" label. Dr. He serves as a consultant to the D'Addario Corporation, and the Conn-Selmer Corporation. Hemke is the recipient of the Kappa Kappa Psi Distinguished Service to Music Award, The Distinguished Service Award from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, the Selmer Lifetime Achievement Award and is an Honorary Alumnus of Augustana College. He presently teaches and coaches each summer at the Frederick L. Hemke Saxophone Institute at "Snow Pond Music Festival" in Sydney, Maine. Dr. Hemke is listed in Who's Who in America, International Who's Who, Who's Who in Music, the New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians, Baker's Biographical Dictionary of Music and Musicians, and the Encyclopédie de la Musique. His students are to be found teaching and performing in major positions throughout the world.

Born in 1955 in Cleveland, Ohio, **Rich Perry** became interested in jazz in high school, and studied briefly at Bowling Green State University, before moving to New York. In 1977 he joined the Thad Jones /Mel Lewis Orchestra—which at that time included Pepper Adams, Jerry Dodgion, Rufus Reid, and Harold Danko—and spent

the next two years touring the U.S. and Europe. After Thad Jones left the band, Perry continued playing with Mel Lewis, recording three LP's with him, including Live in Montreux, and Naturally. The band, with Perry as a key member, is now known as The Vanguard Jazz Orchestra, and continues to tour and record. Three of their recent cds have been nominated for Grammy awards. A highlight of Perry's career has been his association with the gifted composer and arranger Maria Schneider. As a charter member of her orchestra, Perry has been featured on all of her cds including, Allegresse, Coming About, Evanesence, and the Grammy award winning Concert In The Garden. Sky Blue, features Rich's Piece, a beautiful composition written for him. He has performed with her in Europe, Asia, and throughout the U.S. Rich Perry is also a member of the George Mraz Quartet, the Matt Panayides Group, the Dave Scott Quintet, and the John Fedchock New York Big Band. He has also played in several groups led by the pianist Fred Hersch.



Eugene Rousseau has performed across North America and on five continents since his Carnegie Hall debut. The legendary saxophonist Marcel Mule described Rousseau as "a brilliant saxophonist and distinguished artist," and critics the world over have echoed Mule's praise. Rousseau's artistry has inspired many "firsts." He gave the first solo saxophone recitals in Paris, Berlin, Vienna, London and Amsterdam. He has given a yearly master course at the prestigious Mozarteum in Salzburg during 1991-2001, marking the first time that the saxo-

phone was included at that institution. He has premiered numerous works written for him, including the Partita by Juan Orrego-Salas (with the Haydn Trio of Vienna), Jindřich Feld's Sonata for alto saxophone and piano, and Concerto for saxophones and orchestra, Bernhard Heiden's Fantasia Concertante for alto saxophone and winds, Hear Again in Memory, by Frederick Fox, Don Freund's Skyscrapings for alto saxophone and piano, and Concertos by Libby Larsen, Claude Baker, and David DeBoor Canfield. Rousseau has appeared with the Minnesota Orchestra under Leonard Slatkin, the PanAmerican Festival Orchestra under Lukas Foss, the Indianapolis Symphony under Raymond Leppard and Phillipe Entremont, the BBC Orchestra in London, the Janácek Philharmonic (Czech Republic), the Prague Symphony, the Kansai Philharmonic (Osaka), and the Santiago Philharmonic (Chile), He has given recitals and master classes throughout the world on a variety of topics related to his instrument. His solo performances include appearances with the U.S. Army Band at Kennedy Center, the Budapest Strings in Hungary, and the Tokyo Bach Band, as well as the Hamamatsu International Wind Instrument Festival in Japan. The Chicago-born Rousseau's service to the saxophone community is of long standing. For twenty years he was Yamaha Corporation's chief consultant for saxophone research, contributing to the development of acoustic improvements in saxophones and mouthpieces. Rousseau co-founded the World Saxophone Congress in 1969 and has been President of both the North American Saxophone Alliance (1979-80) and the Comité International du Saxophone (1982-85). In May 1998, he was honored as a Distinguished Alumnus by the University of Iowa, at which institution he earned the Ph.D. degree, his principal teacher being Himie Voxman. He holds the title of Distinguished Professor emeritus at Indiana University's Jacob School of Music., having served on the IU faculty from 1964 to 2000. Dr. Rousseau joined the faculty of the University of Minnesota School of Music in fall 2000. In 1993 he was designated an honorary faculty member of the Prague Conservatory. In 2003, Rousseau and the University of Minnesota School of Music hosted the 13th World Saxophone Congress Convention. He left his position at the University of Minnesota in 2015 to pursue continued performances, master classes, recording and writing.

Dr. **Eric Allen** is Assistant Professor of Music and Assistant Director of Bands at Texas Tech University. His responsibilities include conducting the Symphonic Band, teaching undergraduate conducting, and assisting with direction of the Goin' Band from Raiderland. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in instrumental music education from Florida State University, and a doctor of musical arts in conducting from the University of Minnesota, where he studied with Craig Kirchhoff. Prior to completing his doctorate, Allen served as Director of Bands at Sebastian River High School in Florida for over ten years. His ensembles consistently earned top honors with performances at the Bands of America National Concert Band Festival, the Southern Division of

the College Band Directors National Association Conference and the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic. Dr. Allen recently contributed to GIA Publications' Teaching Music through Performance in Band-Solos with Band Accompaniment edition, and his recent research also includes a documentation of the life, work and musical interpretation of conductor/composer Joseph Kreines. His recognitions include four Citations of Excellence from the National Band Association and being named the 2006 Indian River County (FL) District Teacher of the Year. In addition to making music, Dr. Allen enjoys spending time with his wife Emily and children, Audrey and Brady.



David E. Becker was appointed Interim Director of Orchestral Studies for 2013-14 at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Texas, and he accepted the permanent position beginning September, 2014. He served as the Interim Conductor of the Lubbock Youth Symphony Orchestra for 2014-15. Professor Becker, Professor Emeritus, was the Director of Orchestral Studies and Conductor of the Symphony, Chamber, and Opera Orchestras at the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music (WI) from 2005-2012. He was the recipient of the Lawrence University 2010 Excellence in Teaching Award and received the Honorary Degree of Master of Arts in recognition of meritorious achievement in 2012. He received the Distinguished Service Award from the Fox Valley Symphony (WI) for his work as the Interim Conductor of the Fox Valley Symphony Youth

Orchestra (Appleton, WI) during 2011. Awarded Professor Emeritus at the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 2005, he was Director of Orchestras and Professor of the Graduate Orchestral Conducting Program from 1984-2005. Maestro Becker and the UW Symphony Orchestra received critical acclaim for their international tours to Central Europe (1998) and Spain (2001). He was the Associate Conductor of the Madison Symphony (1985-1992), Music Director/Conductor of the Racine Symphony (WI) (1989-1993), and the recipient of the 2012 Distinguished Service Award from the Wisconsin Chapter of ASTA. Before moving to Madison in 1984, Professor Becker was Director of Orchestras and Graduate Conducting at the University of Miami, Coral Gables. He went to Miami in 1980 from the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music where he was Associate Professor of Applied Viola and Conductor of the String Arts Ensemble. During the 1980-82 seasons, Mr. Becker was appointed Assistant Conductor for Maestro Rainer Miedel and the Florida Philharmonic (Miami). Other resident conducting appointments have included the Northern Ohio (Oberlin), Greater Miami (FL) Youth Symphony Orchestras, and the Brevard (NC) Summer Music Festival. Mr. Becker's career as an artist violist has included the Atlanta, Syracuse, Savannah, Louisville, Memphis, and Madison Symphonies, the Santa Fe and Miami Operas, the Sewanee (TN), Brevard (NC), and Peninsula (WI) Summer Music Festivals, the resident faculty string quartets at the Universities of Miami, Georgia, Memphis State, Oberlin Conservatory, and the Eduard Melkus String Quartet touring in the U.S. and Europe. Mr. Becker is widely recognized for his dedication to teaching student musicians which has resulted in high school/university orchestra clinics, and guest conducting Regional and All-State Honor Orchestras in 43 states. More recently Professor Becker was invited to guest conduct the Zhuying Symphony Orchestra in Guanghou and Zhanjiinag (2011) China, the MENC All-National Honors Orchestra at the Kennedy Center in Washington DC (2012), and serve as a clinician/conductor for the ASTA National Orchestra Conference (2013), and the Ohio State University Summer String Teacher's Workshop beginning in 2006.



Born in Seoul, Korea, **David Cho** immigrated to the United States in 1985. David received a variety of music lessons during his childhood in Palos Verdes, California before focusing his energy exclusively on the piano. He later attended Oberlin College and Conservatory where he received his Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance. In 1996, David won the E. Nakamichi Concerto Competition at the Aspen Music Festival and was awarded the Arthur Dann Prize at the Oberlin Conservatory. In 1999, while acquiring his Master of Music in Piano Performance at the Peabody Institute at Johns Hopkins University, David was invited by Robert Spano and Seiji Ozawa to attend the prestigious Tanglewood Music Center as a Merrill Lynch Conducting Fellow. David was then invited by Larry Rachleff to study at Rice University where he

served as guest conductor for the Shepherd School Orchestras while acquiring his Master of Music in Instrumental Conducting. David was subsequently invited by the Vienna Philharmonic to serve as an Assistant Conductor. Dr. McKoin conducts the Texas Tech University Wind Ensemble and teaches all levels of conducting and wind literature. She just completed her ninth summer in residence at the Brevard Music Center where she serves on the conducting faculty and conducts the Transylvania Wind Ensemble comprised of college-aged musicians from throughout the country. Prior to her appointment at Texas Tech, Professor McKoin was the Director of Bands at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and held appointments at the State University of New York at Buffalo and SUNY Fredonia. Prior to joining the ASU faculty in the fall of 2012, Creviston was on the faculty at the Crane School of Music, SUNY Potsdam. Dr. Patrick **Murphy** is currently manager of the theater department at the ground-breaking **Musical Instrument** Museum in Phoenix,

AZ. He has previously served on the faculty of the Crane School of Music, State University of New York, College at Potsdam. He completed his doctorate from Arizona State University, and holds degrees from The University of Michigan, and the Crane School of Music where he studied saxophone with Timothy McAllister, Donald Sinta, and Eric Lau and composition with David Heinick. Todd Oxford's artistry has been heard all over the world in Europe, Asia, Mexico, Canada, and the US. Recent venues include Carnegie Hall, Weill



Mana Quartet is a DAddario Performing Ensemble. Members are Michael Hernandez, soprano, Michael Mortarotti, alto, Diane Hunger, tenor and Thomas Giles, baritone.

Founded in 2013, the **Melange Saxophone Quartet** came to fruition through Kyle Stec, Ben Tate, Michael McConnell, and Jason Pockrus while all were attending the University of North Texas. The ensemble has evolved since its inception, with the addition of Alexander Richards in 2014, and Tony Barrette and Nick Allington in 2015. Focusing on a beautifully blended saxophone sound as well as artistic mastery, MSQ has given performances and masterclasses around the United States including appearances at Baylor University, Texas Tech, Howard College, Midwestern State, and the University of North Texas.

The Oklahoma Saxophone Collective has premiered works by Bosnian composer Igor Kara-

ca and Serbian composer Vladimir Tosic.

The Oklahoma State Saxophone Octet is comprised of saxophonists eager to broaden the repertoire of the saxophone ensemble through performing, arranging and commissioning new works. Performances by the ensemble look to the past for established excellence as well as to the new, adventurous minds of this generation's composers. Ken Foerch, a former member of the U.S. Marine Band, and Adrian Williams, a product of Richard's own studio, proved to be the perfect match in tone quality and musical concept. It is the aspiration of the Orion Quartet to perform a diverse array of music in a manner true to the composer's intent and the style of the era while also exploiting the full tonal and expressive range of Adolphe Sax's grand invention. With a repertoire spanning five centuries, the Orion Saxophone Quartet demonstrates a

perpetually robust sonority and superb command of the melodic line.



Coming together in 2009, the **Post-Haste Reed Duo** has toured colleges and universities throughout the Unit-

ed States, performing and presenting master classes in woodwind performance, chamber music, and entrepreneurship. Additionally, they have appeared at national meetings of College Music Society, North American Saxophone Alliance, and the Society for Electro Acoustic Music in the United States. Post-Haste has been featured artists at the Jubilus Festival in Gainesville, FL, White Lake Chamber Music Festival in White Lake, MI, Friends of Rain New Music Ensemble of Portland, OR, Future Music Oregon in Eugene, OR, and has served as Enseble-In-Residence for Classical Revolution PDX's inaugural Outreach Series Program.
